Goal One: Incorporate bar coding for inventory at our warehouse.

BHA is currently operating utilizing the Tenmast system. In the near future the system will switch over to MRI which is a web-based application. Launch date is anticipated Quarter 1 of 2024.

Goal Two: Collaborate with local agencies when advantageous to provide affordable housing services to our residents. Promote links to community services through BHA Community Centers and our FSS program, and at other sites to meet the changing needs of BHA residents, focusing on programs and services that enrich residents' lives, promote independence, increase community involvement and support successful tenancies in public housing.

New Rule Action Plan was approved by HUD on September 26, 2022. Currently working on scheduling meetings, which will meet two times per year. Continue to work on adding partner agencies to the Program Coordination Committee (PCC), in which twenty-two more agencies have been added to the Program Coordination Committee. BHA has been meeting with Mayor Reynolds regarding ways to develop new affordable housing units in the City of Bethlehem.

Goal Three: Continue to translate all key documents as they are created.

Primarily using Verbatim for translations, certain staff member can translate if capable. Continuing to translate all key documents as they are created.

Goal Four: Continue to enforce the No Smoking Policy in BHA units and monitor designated smoking areas on BHA properties. *No smoking policy continues to be re-enforced.*

Goal Five: Continue discussions to expand the Authority's BHA-TV notification program to the family developments.

BHA TV is available in the Pembroke, Marvine, Pfeifle and Fairmount developments. We are still working with the cable company that provides cable service to Lynfield and Parkridge to get BHA TV in those developments.

Goal Six: Continue renovating public housing properties and making capital improvements which promote fire and life safety as well as preserve the asset. Maintain high quality and timely design, bidding and construction, conserving energy and water and protecting the environment to the greatest extent feasible. Continue to actively involve residents, staff and the community in planning capital improvements. Promptly close out Capital Fund Recovery Grants. Apply for additional grants that may become available.

The last 2 phases of the Lynfield renovations should be completed in early 2023. The parking lot addition at Litzenberger was completed in September 2022 and roofing replacement at Fairmount was completed in October 2022. Upcoming projects include starting renovations in the Pembroke development, HVAC replacements at Bodder and Bartholomew Houses, roofing replacement at Pembroke and the construction of 12 apartments at the former Marvine recreation building. We continue to provide required documents for Capital Fund grants as they become available and close out grants once funds are fully expended. Comments received from the annual public meeting are incorporated into capital planning.

Goal Seven: Continue to maintain safety and security at all BHA housing and work sites for residents, staff, and the public. Promote nonviolence in all aspects of BHA's work. Continue to enhance safety and security efforts through community policing and physical improvements to properties.

Working on installing cameras in all High Rise parking lots for security surveillance. These cameras are looking to be installed on the exterior of the High Rises. Planning on replacing/upgrading older camera systems throughout our developments.

Goal Eight: Maintain high utilization of vouchers and budget without exceeding authorized limits. Continue to advocate for full voucher funding and program reform, while preparing contingency plans for possible radical cuts in federal funding. Continue to accept the HUD-Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing Program (VASH) vouchers from other Housing Authorities and work with partner agencies to receive referrals.

HUD gave another waiver to raise the Payment Standards to 120% effective 1/1/2023 and are as followed: One bedroom apartments will be raised to \$1,102 from \$939 and \$1,396 from \$1,196 for a two bedroom apartment. BHA owned, Marvine Recreation building will be converted to 12 HCV 1 bedroom units (9 units on the 1st floor and 3 on the 2nd floor), ADA accessible units will also be available.

Goal Nine: Update Admissions and Continued Occupancy (ACOP), Administration policy manual and BHA lease. Establish and maintain regular meetings with community partners in an effort to keep lines of communication open. Minimize confusion and misunderstanding while addressing changing policies that affect all.

ACOP continues to be updated as needed. Anticipates reviewing ACOP with other heads of management and administration in order to update it were necessary. Monthly meetings will be held with the staff to discuss any updates that may arise.

Goal Ten: Convert physical tenant files into a digital format using computer software to prevent destruction of physical files, free up space in BHA buildings, and efficiently find requested documents in files.

CHOO is 100% converted to digital; FDO continues to scan physical files to become 100% digital.

Furthermore, under Section 5A(d)(15) of the U.S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended, a PHA must submit a civil rights certification with its Annual PHA Plan, which is described at 24 CFR 903.7(o)(1) except for qualified PHAs who submit the Form HUD-50077-CR as a standalone document.
